Good afternoon students, staff, parents, and community members,

This month, we are going to begin with the decision from District 60 to not recommend a contract for Chavez/Huerta Preparatory Academy for the upcoming 2025-2026 school year. I was quite taken back by their decision and am surprised that after twenty-four years of partnership, they have decided not to renew our contract. In my opinion, there are a variety of factors that have gone into their decision. Some revolve around budget and finance, some around academic achievement, but I believe that this decision is being made to not offer a contract really centers on competition. We are competing for the same students and our budgets are based on students who attend the district and students who attend the charter schools. Declining enrollments are being felt not only in Pueblo and the Pueblo community, but also across the state. District 60 recently held a community event explaining the financial shortcomings they will face as the Governor looks to end the enrollment averaging for all school districts across the state. Although we have met and exceeded our budgets for the last two years, and we saw great academic growth in the 22-23 school year, District 60 has decided to recommend non-renewal to their Board of Education.

So what happens next? We will await the District 60 Board of Education decision on Tuesday, January 28th. If they decide to renew, we will remain as part of the district as an authorized charter school for at least a year. If they decide to non-renew our contract, we will ask for the district to release their exclusive authority to authorize us so CHPA can seek authorization from the state or another district. If the district decides not to release that authority, we will have to appeal to CDE and allow our attorney to make a case on behalf of CHPA.

I am very hopeful that the Board of Education will allow CHPA to continue to operate as a charter school in District 60, however we are researching and planning if that decision does not occur. We are looking to continue to be a school of innovation and creativity by bringing such programs such as online learning, dual-language immersion, and maybe a pre-school one day to CHPA. We will improve the growth and achievement or our students to ensure they are ready for college courses when they enter high school. We will maintain fiscal responsibility as we continue to balance funding between the classroom and our new facilities. Finally, we will continue to offer a choice to our parents by providing a culturally diverse based education to assist students in taking pride in their heritage.

4. "If you tell me when someone is hurting you or scaring you, I will always believe you no matter who it is."

Unfortunately, the mass majority of abuse our kids encounter is from people we/they know and trust. They need to know that we will believe them and can help them through it.

What is Safe2Tell?

Safe2Tell provides students and adults in Colorado communities and schools a way to help prevent violence and anonymously report urgent safety concerns. Safe2Tell reporting is anonymous so that students feel comfortable acting as advocates for the safety of themselves and others.

Safe2Tell was founded on the idea that early intervention is the key to preventing violence and saving lives. The program promotes early intervention by serving as a relay of information between people submitting reports and local multidisciplinary teams, such as schools and law enforcement agencies.

Who determines the report response?

Local teams in the school district determine how best to respond to Safe2Tell reports. These teams often consist of law enforcement, school administrators, and may also include mental health experts.

Local law enforcement or schools can address specific questions on their Safe2Tell response policies.

Is Safe2Tell working?

The number of Safe2Tell reports continues to grow each year with over 28,000 in the 2023-2024 school year. The majority of reports are determined by multidisciplinary teams to be valid reports. The goal of a Safe2Tell report is to protect, to prevent, or to help.

FAQ:

- Adults can submit Safe2Tell reports about their own concerns or on behalf of their child. Like all Safe2Tell reports, they will be anonymous.
- A student's academic record cannot include Safe2Tell reports.
- Safe2Tell does not notify the person who made a report of the report outcome. All outcome information is confidential. General outcome data is available in the Safe2Tell <u>annual reports.</u>
- Safe2Tell cannot enforce a certain outcome even if someone is dissatisfied with the outcome of a situation previously reported to their school. Please find the appropriate contact within your school or district for escalating these concerns.
- Safe2Tell is the middleman and sends the report information to the school and law enforcement. Any relay of safety information to parents would have to come from the school, not Safe2Tell.

What if a report is made about my child?

- We've taught Colorado students about Safe2Tell since 2004. Students know it is a safe place to report concerns. Safe2Tell reports are a sign that classmates have noticed concerning behavior and want to help. We encourage them that if they see something harmful, they can do something helpful.
- Safe2Tell reports are not punitive. They do not mean your student is in trouble.
- One Colorado teen told us their thoughts on what parents should do when they are worried about their child: "As much as I fight it, make me talk about it!"


